**Gender-sensitivity of AIDS responses**

**Addressing Women, Girls, Gender Inequality and HIV:  
A mapping of global, regional and multi-country activities by the  
UNAIDS and UNIFEM**

## I. Introduction

Decision point 7 of the 22<sup>nd</sup> UNAIDS Programme Coordinating Board meeting on *gender-sensitivity of AIDS responses* stressed the importance of building on existing knowledge and leadership both within and beyond the UN family, as well as the importance of being informed by lessons from other gender-focused efforts. An important step in following up to the PCB decision was to conduct a rapid mapping of relevant UNAIDS and UNIFEM activities and accomplishments relating to women, girls and gender inequality in the context of HIV.

This mapping documents activities of the ten UNAIDS Cosponsors, the UNAIDS Secretariat, and UNIFEM in addressing women, girls, gender equality and HIV. Given the rapid scope of the mapping, the activities recorded should be considered *representative* rather than a comprehensive record of ongoing efforts. The purpose of the mapping is to assess the scope and focus of current UNAIDS activities in order to improve coordination and alignment in the work of the UN on women, girls, gender inequality and HIV.<sup>1</sup>

The mapping includes information on global, regional and multi-country programming, encompassing activities that are currently being implemented, recently completed activities and activities planned for the near future. The first round of data collection for the mapping prioritized the documentation of regional and global efforts by UNAIDS Cosponsors, the Secretariat and UNIFEM, in order to shape and inform follow-up on the PCB decision. ***A number of important country level initiatives have also been highlighted through this process, but the mapping did not request information from country offices. Therefore, information about country-based initiatives should be considered partial and only indicative.***

Based on the information received, the mapping illustrates overall trends in activities, organized by agency, activity type, and geographic reach. The report offers an overview of agency programming type and geographic level in order to highlight common themes. In doing so, the report also offers examples of indicative projects in each geographic level. It is complemented by an accompanying matrix showing all the data collected. While the analysis is intended to illustrate the nature and scope of support by the UNAIDS family and UNIFEM, it does not provide a comprehensive overview of all activities relating to women, girls, gender-equality and HIV.

## II. Organization of information

More than 200 different activities were identified as part of this mapping exercise. They have been organized into three broad categories: technical and financial support; policy development and advocacy; and research. Given that the goals of promoting gender equality and responding to HIV are cross-cutting, many of the initiatives fit into more than one category and some have components in all three categories. For the purpose of this report, activities have been grouped according to the most prominent of the three classifications. Furthermore, while in many cases organizational activities specifically address the intersection of gender and HIV, in other instances the initiatives listed are components of larger efforts to address HIV or promote gender-equality and empower women.

<sup>1</sup> The task for this mapping was to focus on programming that focuses on women, girls and gender inequality. A separate mapping of programming on men who have sex with men and transgender persons is currently being conducted.

While the mapping focused on global and regional activities, some information was also provided about country-level programming. Activities were, therefore, sub-categorized by geographical reach, using the categories of global, regional, multi-country or country level. More specifically, geographic groupings consist of the following:

- 1) Global
- 2) Regional
  - Eastern Europe and Central Asia
  - Middle East and North Africa
  - Sub-Saharan Africa
  - Asia and Pacific
  - Latin American and Caribbean
- 3) Multi-country (for projects undertaken in two or more countries, but not representative of regional or global reach)

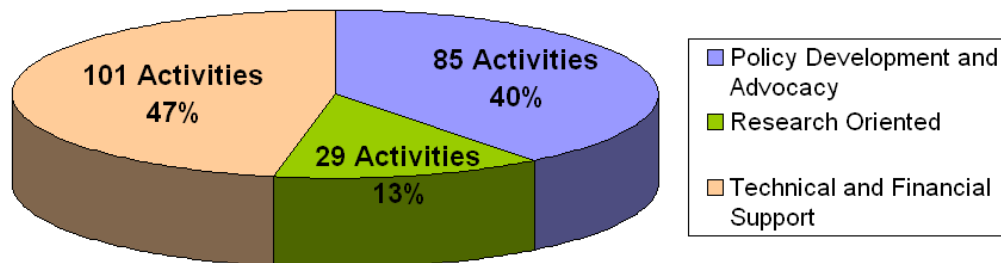
### III. Overall Trends

Since the scope of the mapping is partial and did not include consultation with country offices, the information should be considered as an indicative illustration of activities. As such, it points to areas in which there is programming strength, as well as areas in which there appear to be gaps. Activities are primarily focused at the regional and global level, with some key multi-country or country efforts also identified.<sup>2</sup>

An analysis of reported activity by type of intervention shows that almost half of projects undertaken and planned by all UNAIDS Cosponsors, the Secretariat and UNIFEM consist of technical and financial support (47%), followed by policy development and advocacy (40%), and a relatively small number that are research oriented (13%).

While the strong emphasis on technical and financial support reflects increasing attention to women, girls, and HIV, the overall lack of emphasis on research efforts is notable, given the more general paucity of evidence on a global scale addressing the links between gender equality and HIV. This is therefore a particularly important gap to address.

## **A. Research**

### **Global level**

Reported global level research tends to focus on a few key areas: documentation of promising practices; assessment of types of strategies undertaken by governmental and non-governmental actors; and analysis of women's knowledge and leadership in relation to HIV issues and responses. For example:

- UNIFEM, along with select NGO partners, is conducting an analysis of promising strategies and successful approaches in addressing the intersections of violence against women and HIV, as well as a review of women's participation and leadership in national AIDS responses, also supported by UNDP.
- The UNAIDS Secretariat is documenting ongoing efforts to incorporate attention to girls and women in national strategic planning processes to provide "real time" insight into challenges, opportunities and entry points.
- UNESCO has undertaken research on sexual knowledge and behaviour of adolescent females globally using empowering methodologies, and has also partnered with the Social Science Research Council on a publication entitled, "The Fourth Wave: An Assault on Women - Gender, Culture and HIV/AIDS in the 21st Century.
- UNDP, in collaboration with Fordham University is gathering documentation and research about the impact of unequal property and inheritance laws and practices on women and girls, particularly in terms of exacerbating the impact of HIV.

### **Regional level**

Trends in research tend to emphasize specific groups such as married women or migrants as is appropriate and/or relevant to the particular region. Examples include:

#### *Asia and the Pacific*

- The UNAIDS Secretariat is working with UNDP, UNIFEM, APN+, ICW, ASEAN Foundation, GTZ on the development of HIV prevention strategies for spousal transmission in Asian countries.
- UNDP is conducting a multi-country study on the HIV vulnerabilities and stigma and discrimination faced by female migrant workers from Asia to the Middle East.

#### *Eastern Europe and Central Asia*

- UNICEF has developed situation analyses on gender and most-at-risk for seven countries of Eastern and Southeastern Europe

#### *Latin America and the Caribbean*

- UNESCO is producing a collection of articles under the title of "From Risk to Vulnerability: Power, Culture and Gender in the Spread of HIV and AIDS in the Caribbean".

#### *Sub-Saharan Africa*

- The UNAIDS Secretariat is undertaking a mapping of women's organizations working on HIV issues in West and Central Africa.

### **Multi-country level<sup>3</sup>**

At multi-country level, a varied range of research initiatives are taking place, including compilation of sex-disaggregated data, and use of gender assessments. For instance:

- The World Bank is developing a Social and Gender Assessment of HIV and AIDS among Refugee Populations in the Great Lakes Region of Africa, focusing on Burundi, the Democratic Republic of Congo, Kenya, Rwanda, Tanzania, and Uganda. It has also undertaken a gender portfolio review of 15 Multi-Country HIV and AIDS Programs (MAPs) in Sub-Saharan Africa, including five detailed country assessments.
- The UNAIDS Secretariat is working on a gender assessment of work plans and activities of the Asia Regional Support Team and UNAIDS Country Offices in Fiji, Nepal, and Vietnam.
- UNIFEM is supporting research with partners on a range of issues including sexuality and HIV (Caribbean); violence against women and HIV (Mexico); and spousal transmission (Indonesia, Laos, Cambodia).
- UNFPA is developing a study on the impact of microfinance on women's reproductive health, including on HIV in 13 countries.
- ILO is compiling gender-disaggregated research and field based evidence about the gender dimensions of HIV in the workplace in Botswana, Burkina Faso, Cameroon, Ghana, Lesotho, and Madagascar.

## **B. Policy development and advocacy**

### **Global level**

Policy development and advocacy is the second largest reported area of focus for the ten UNAIDS Cosponsors, the Secretariat and UNIFEM. Trends in this area include the collection and use of data as an advocacy tool, the use of media campaigns, awareness raising initiatives as well as a focus on significantly improving the use of evidence as a tool for advocacy. Sample initiatives include:

- A multiagency partnership, the Secretary General's Campaign UNite to End Violence against Women and Girls seeks to increase public awareness, political will and resources for preventing and responding to violence against women and girls.
- The UN Action against Sexual Violence in Conflict is a multi-agency activity, which aims to generate public awareness, end impunity, improve and scale-up services for survivors, and address long-term impact of sexual violence on communities and national development.
- UNFPA is working on an advocacy document providing evidence for the links between violence against women and HIV, as well as a policy guidance note on women, girls and HIV. It is also creating a toolkit for engaging men and boys in the areas of sexual and reproductive health; HIV and gender based violence prevention; and maternal, newborn and child health.
- The UNAIDS Secretariat is working on the creation of an advocacy/reference document presenting the latest epidemiological trends and UN General Assembly Special Session data describing national responses to AIDS, with a special focus on girls and women.
- UNIFEM is developing key indicators on gender equality and HIV in the context of aid effectiveness and support to monitoring of national targets on gender and HIV.
- Along with the UNAIDS Secretariat and the Global Coalition on Women and AIDS, WHO will focus on supporting increased evidence-building, advocacy and programming on the intersection of HIV and violence against women.
- An interagency effort, led by UNDP, prepared a draft Gender Guidance for National AIDS Responses for consideration at the 22<sup>nd</sup> UNAIDS Programme Coordinating Board session, at which the guidance was noted. Core elements of the guidance are now being used to support capacity building efforts on integrating gender into national AIDS responses.

## **Regional level**

The greatest number of regional policy development and advocacy activities are based in sub-Saharan Africa. Trends in initiatives across all regions include a focus on discrete groups (trafficked women, sex workers, refugees), along with the innovative use of specific kinds of advocates (first ladies, bloggers) to raise awareness around women, girls and HIV. Another trend is the creation of educational tools for advocacy efforts. For example:

### *Asia and the Pacific*

- UNDP has implemented multiple activities on legal advocacy in relation to women and HIV, including convening a regional court addressing women's property rights and inheritance, a court on trafficking in Southeast Asia, and related policy and advocacy on the linkages between barriers to inheritance and property for women and the impact of HIV on them.
- The UNAIDS Secretariat, along with UNDP and UNIFEM has also participated in a regional advocacy initiative on the issue of inheritance and property rights.
- UNDP produced a "Development Practitioner's Guide to Women and HIV"

### *Eastern Europe and Central Asia*

- UNHCR is developing a policy response to address HIV among sex workers who are internally displaced or refugees in Eastern Europe.

### *Latin America and the Caribbean*

- The UNAIDS Secretariat has supported the creation of a Latin America and the Caribbean coalition of women and first ladies.
- UNDP supported creation of a 'Caribbean Vulnerable Communities' group to strengthen advocacy for marginalized populations, and organized a human rights and advocacy workshop addressing Caribbean vulnerable communities.

### *Middle East and North Africa*

- UNDP is supporting bloggers and independent media to address issues of HIV, men who have sex with men and human rights issues.
- UNDP has been working with female religious leaders and engaging women's NGOs in the HIV response in the Arab States, including by facilitating the empowerment of women living with HIV in the region.

### *Sub-Saharan Africa*

- The UNAIDS Secretariat has created multi-country profiles of initiatives focused on changing harmful socio-cultural norms in the context of gender and HIV.
- UNESCO has created e-learning modules addressing life skills, HIV mainstreaming, and gender issues in the region.
- UNHCR is working on sexual and gender based programs among refugees.
- The World Bank held a consultation on mainstreaming gender in national strategies and AIDS responses and created a trainer's facilitation manual on building a gender informed response to the AIDS crisis. It has also worked on mainstreaming HIV in sector lending responses around agriculture and rural development vis-à-vis gender and inequality.

## **Multi-country level**

Almost all UNAIDS Cosponsors, the UNAIDS Secretariat and UNIFEM engage in and support country level projects in the areas of policy development and advocacy. Trends in project activities include addressing stigma and discrimination, as well as a focus on groups such as refugees and indigenous women. Highlights of projects taking place at country level include:

- The UNAIDS Secretariat is working with celebrities in Russia and Ukraine to counteract HIV related stigma.
- UNFPA has developed report cards on HIV prevention for girls and young women in 25 countries, as well as six follow ups to the report cards. The campaign, "Does HIV Look Like Me?" records video diaries of young people living with HIV (at least 75%

- young women) to lobby governments, service providers and other key stakeholders to help prevent HIV and mitigate its impact.
- UNHCR is working on initiatives in select African countries to combat stigma and discrimination among refugees living with HIV, and combat HIV amongst female sex workers
- UNDP is using community conversations to address stigma and discrimination against people living with HIV and gender inequalities in Botswana, Lesotho, Namibia and Swaziland.
- In India and Zimbabwe, UNIFEM is working on “gender equality zones”, community-led initiatives providing lessons on how gender relations can be improved and gender stereotypes challenged as part of addressing HIV among women and girls.
- WHO is planning to implement a tool on integrating gender into HIV programmes in the health sector in four countries to be determined

### **C. Trends in technical and financial support**

Technical and financial support constitutes the largest category of reported projects at the global, regional, and multi-country level. Because of the large number of projects fitting into this category (101), this report further sub-divides technical and financial support into the broad based categories of institutional strengthening, programming support, and capacity-building, to illustrate the range of programming efforts taking place in this area. A sampling of projects includes:

#### **Global level**

Trends in technical and financial support include institutional support to women’s NGOs and other institutions addressing women, girls, gender inequality and HIV; internal (organizational) capacity building of staff members (“in-reach”); and support for programming efforts integrating gender into HIV strategies and action plans.

A sampling of projects includes:

#### Capacity Building

- The UNAIDS Secretariat is working on capacity enhancement of staff members on gender issues; technical support to GFATM processes, and conceptualization/framework development for greater integration of gender in national AIDS responses.
- UNFPA and UNIFEM have created a strategic partnership to build capacity of their staff to undertake gender responsive budgeting.
- ILO is working to assist stakeholders to mainstream gender and workplace issues in GFATM proposals.

#### Institutional Strengthening

- The UNIFEM Trust Fund to End Violence against Women funds NGOs to address the intersection of violence against women and HIV and supports organizational efforts to address these issues, in addition to a monitoring and evaluation process that tracks the impact of these Trust Fund supported projects.
- In the area of prevention of mother-to children transmission (PMTCT), UNICEF supports the provision of innovative packaging of supplies to meet the needs of HIV positive pregnant women and their children during the antenatal, delivery and postnatal period.
- 

#### Programming

- UNESCO is working to support EDUCAIDS implementation in 55 countries with gender equality as a core element.

- The World Bank has supported the integration of gender into AIDS Strategies and Action plans, including through targeted technical and financial support.
- UNFPA and UNICEF have established a Joint Programme and Trust Fund for the abandonment of female genital mutilation/cutting.
- UNICEF provides support for gender-sensitive life-skills based education with an HIV component in over 70 countries.
- UNDP and UNIFEM have established a corporate partnership to strengthen joint programming on gender and AIDS.

### **Regional level**

As with policy development and advocacy, the majority of reported projects are focused on sub-Saharan Africa. In all regions, there is an emphasis on capacity building, with a large number of trainings and workshops. Relatively few projects across all regions focus on institutional strengthening, while programming trends include increasing women's socio-economic power through projects on inheritance rights and micro-credit.

#### Capacity Building

##### *Asia and the Pacific*

- ILO is working on a training of trainers around men as partners in reproductive health in the Pacific Islands.

##### *Eastern Europe and Central Asia*

- UNESCO supported a training program for journalists on gender sensitive reporting vis-à-vis HIV.

##### *Latin America and the Caribbean*

- UNIFEM supports development of an online capacity building tool entitled "Empowerment: HIV/AIDS and Violence against Women".

##### *Middle East and North Africa*

- UNDP is supporting women's rights organizations and female religious leaders to address harmful practices in the context of HIV in the Arab region

##### *Sub-Saharan Africa*

- WFP is integrating gender and HIV into leadership training for Relief Committees in Southern Africa.
- UNIFEM is supporting capacity development to strengthen efforts to address women's access to property and inheritance rights in the context of HIV.
- The UNAIDS Secretariat is supporting a regional consultation on gender in GFATM Proposals.
- UNESCO conducted a regional training for Great Lakes countries on Human Rights and HIV with an emphasis on gender.

#### Institutional Strengthening

##### *Latin America and the Caribbean*

- UNAIDS supports the Caribbean Coalition on HIV and AIDS.
- UNDP has been supporting women's rights organizations to respond to HIV in the Arab States region, including by popularizing tools to strengthen capacities and enhance leadership skills to empower women and mainstream HIV in the activities of women's organizations.

#### Programming

##### *Asia and the Pacific*

- UNDP supports an Asian regional initiative on socio-economic empowerment of women living with HIV.

##### *Sub-Saharan Africa*



- UNHCR supported access to micro-credit projects and agricultural kits for vulnerable refugee women and people living with HIV.
- The UNAIDS Secretariat supported a regional coalition to discuss evidence on drivers and risk of vulnerability of young women and girls and agree on priority policy and programme action in hyper-endemic countries in Southern Africa

### **Multi-country level**

Trends at the country level include support to civil society institutions; capacity building to address gender issues in national strategic plans and GFATM proposals; trainings on gender and HIV for vulnerable groups; and programming efforts emphasize the importance of multi-stakeholder and participatory processes. A sampling of projects includes the following:

#### Capacity Building

- The UNAIDS Secretariat is providing financial and technical support for select countries in Latin America to strengthen the gender components of their national strategic plans and GFATM proposals.
- In multiple countries, ILO is working on a pre-migration training on HIV for prospective migrants.

#### Institutional Strengthening

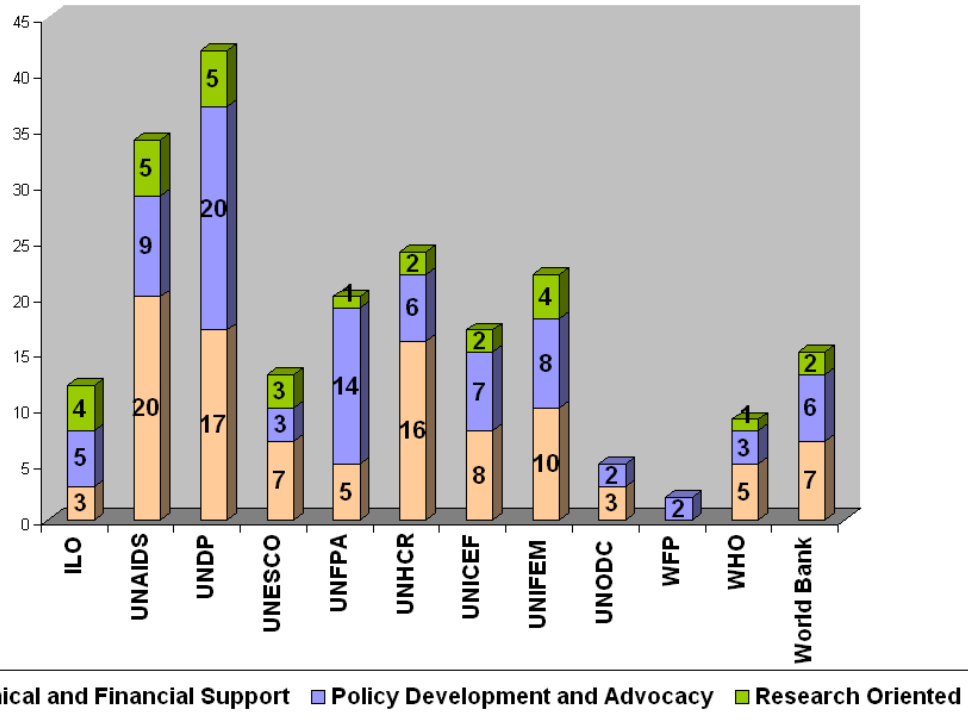
- UNDP is focusing on institutional strengthening of a national organization of activists working for women's rights, with emphasis on the rights of female sex workers in select countries in Latin America.

#### Programming

- In multiple countries across Africa, UNHCR is facilitating access to vocational training for vulnerable refugee women; supporting voluntary counseling and testing for refugee and host communities; and supporting prevention of parent to child transmission for refugees and host populations.
- UNODC provides HIV prevention and care for female drug users and female prisoners in a variety of countries, including Ukraine and Moldova.

## **V. Activity Emphasis of UNAIDS Cosponsors, the UNAIDS Secretariat and UNIFEM**

The following tables provide a further snapshot of the kinds of activities reported by each of the 10 UNAIDS Cosponsors, the UNAIDS Secretariat and UNIFEM, as well as the level of their geographic reach.

## VI. Conclusion

As the examples above show, the UNAIDS family and UNIFEM are engaging in a diverse set of activities covering the global, regional and country level, and encompassing a wide range of gender specific issues. The focus of work varies depending on each agency's mandate and lead responsibilities under the UNAIDS division of labour. Clearly, there is much more work to be done to provide more comprehensive, targeted and sustainable support on gender to national AIDS responses. At the same time however, this mapping illustrates that there is a wealth of knowledge, leadership and experience that can form the continuing basis for intensifying efforts to scale-up effective action on gender equality and AIDS.
