## **6 Key Messages**

01

The Joint Programme is recognized and respected for supporting key population responses. An area of support that does need to increase is advocacy aimed at defending the human rights of key population groups.

04

The financial sustainability of key population responses is a strategic gap. Investments are needed in programming for key populations, integration of HIV services and making UHC work for different key population groups.

02

Key population programming needs prioritizing to address the high rates of new HIV infections and the inequalities facing key populations. Joint Programme resources should be aligned with evidence of where high incidence among key populations is occurring.



The Global AIDS Strategy tasks the Joint Programme with stepping up support to community-led responses.

Understanding what this means in practice and how this will be realized across cosponsors is a priority next step.

03

Inclusive annual planning processes based on country strategic priorities, and increased targeting of specific key population groups will enhance the relevance of Joint Programme activities. Clear definitions of key population groups vis-à-vis other priority vulnerable populations are needed to focus resources on key population groups.

The Joint Programme's monitoring and reporting system needs an **overhaul** to enable a stronger **'line of sight' between investments, progress and results** of the Joint Programme's work for different key population groups.
