#### Anbunmani Romdass, Indian Minister of Health and Family Welfare

"India is poised to build on the lessons learned internally, to scale up its national response. The state of Tamilnadu has shown us the way the epidemic can be reversed with sustained interplay of programmatic and focused behaviour change interventions."

"We have engaged our entire governance system, especially the village and district councils to offer a coordinated decentralized response to the epidemic at the community level to make our communities HIV resilient. "It is clear to ICASO that there needs to be a greater focus on the rights-based approaches to prevention, including the right to access evidence-based, accurate information, using effective methods, tools and commodities. We need to address the major barriers to accessing these, including the need to commit adequate resources, to protect human rights, to invest in health workers and health care systems, to remove harmful trade policies, and ultimately to base prevention interventions on the evidence of what is effective."
