

AIDS IN CLIMATE-RELATED DISASTERS IN AFRICA: A SNAPSHOT OF UNAIDS' ACTIVITIES*

By working with communities, uniformed services, governments and regional and international partners, UNAIDS supports people living with HIV affected by climate-related disasters to ensure that they have access to the HIV-related services they need and to programmes preventing and addressing gender-based violence. Increases in gender-based violence and in migration trends are often a consequence of climate-related emergencies, compounding the risks factors for vulnerable people.

AFRICAN UNION LIAISON OFFICE

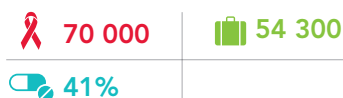
Support implementation of the African Union policy on HIV and peacekeeping operations and conflict-related sexual violence and the response among peacekeepers and uniformed personnel.

EASTERN AND SOUTHERN AFRICA REGIONAL OFFICE

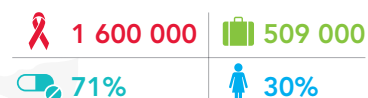
Sexual and reproductive health policy and resource mobilization for countries affected by emergencies. Capacity-building for countries to prepare and respond.

KENYA

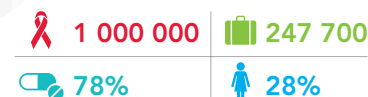
Integration of HIV in emergency-affected regions, including arid and semi-arid lands and border regions.

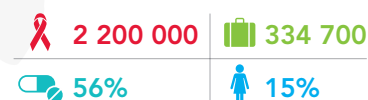
